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ANNUAL REPORT FOR CRY (CHILR RIGHTS & YOU) 2023-2024

Introduction:

Children are said to be the pillars of the society for its progress and development for a larger productivity of the society. However, they were largely affected for the past 2-3 years specially in their academic career and hindering their learning process due to COVID and now the prevailing situation in Manipur due to the civil unrest and conflict resulted in a huge learning gap. The worst is seen in the vulnerable children of the vulnerable families. Families are displaced, houses were burnt down, loss of lives and innumerable loses of both private and public property.

The normal life in the operational areas of Imphal west District is more or less ok but life in the sensitive areas were still suffering from fear, insecurity, anxieties, lack of opportunities, and traumatic conditions specially, elderly people and children who needed the most support, care and protection. Education of the children are mostly affected by the situation of the State. Many Government and Non- Government Stakeholders were providing relief materials, tutoring, psychosocial support and life skill sessions especially in the relief camps from every nook and corner of the State. Our team worked in close coordination with the local stake holders like local club leaders, Meira paibies, AWWs and ASHA workers for providing the relief materials, life skill sessions and also assisting the children both in the relief camps and also in the Remedial Coaching centers basically for bridging the learning gaps and medical health checkup in the operational areas.

The mobile internet ban which was imposed all over the state since the 3rd of May 2023 has been lifted by the government of Manipur on the 3rd of December, 2023. Situations in greater Imphal areas are getting little smoother, however in the periphery and border areas killings of people and gun firings are still going on almost every day. News reports have said that the ongoing conflict had adversely affected all sectors of development works which had already been sanctioned in the 2023-2024 budget and the impact is likely to be felt for so long. In view of the extreme cold winter season approaching in the state, a notification had been issued by Education Director, L. Nandakumar Singh to shut down schools and colleges for 8 days from the 23rd of December till the 30th of December, 2023. In addition to this, to promote Meitei Mayek (Language paper of Manipuri), the Board of Secondary Education Manipur popularly known as BOSEM has signed a memorandum of understanding with MEELAL (Meetei Erol Evek Loinasillol Apunba Lup) to give a cash award of Rs 10,000 to subject toppers of Meetei Mayek subject in the board exam. In other news, the Supreme Court of India had allowed options to hundreds of displaced Manipuri students who fled the State in the wake of the ethnic clashes to attend online classes at Manipur University itself from different parts of the country or they can pursue their studies either at the Assam University, Silchar, or North East Hill University, Shillong. Moreover, there have been newspaper reports on the difficulties of adjustment in the relief camps children and women often leading to PTSD.

Initiatives taken by the team

In the midst of this chaotic situation, the team has taken up many measures such as providing necessary relief materials for the displaced people in the operational areas in Imphal West District of Manipur. The team worked in close coordination with the local stake holders like AWWs and ASHA workers for assisting the children in the relief camps basically for bridging the learning gaps and health checkup.



Names of the relief camps, number of displaced people and the distribution items are listed below---

- 1) Maklang Youth Development Club- Total no. of inmates are 154 in which 38 are children.
- 2) Recent Hr. Sec. school- Total no. of inmates are 180 in which 45 are children.
- 3) Konthoujam Junior High school- Total no. of inmates are 80 in which 31 are children.
- 4) Wisdom palace, Keithelmanbi, Kabui Khul- Total no. of inmates are 142 in which 20 are children.
- 5) L.P School, Moidanpok- Total no. of inmates are 49 in which 21 are children.
- 6) Phayeng High School- Total no. of inmates are 165 in which 39 are children.

The items distributed are ------

- 1) Rice
- 2) Water Bottle
- 3) Fermented fish (Ngari)
- 4) Soap
- 5) Sanitary Pads
- 6) Onion
- 7) Potato

During the SECOND quarter, the team took great initiative in providing necessary relief materials for the displaced people in the operational areas in Imphal West District of Manipur. The team worked in close coordination with the local stake holders like club leaders, AWWs and ASHA workers. The names of the Relief camps were Ideal Girls' School, konthoujam Makha, Khabam High school, Yangngapokpi High School, Joypur Khul Lower Primary School, Recent Hr. Secondary School, Khabamdiar Junior High School, Phayeng high school, Phayeng youth Club, Phayeng Ching khuman, and Langjing Achouba, Old Age Home respectively. The distributed items were Rice bags, potato bags, onions, fermented fish, oils, soaps and water bottles packets.

During the second quarter, distribution of the necessary dietary supplements of the Soccer team(girls) both for the two villages namely Maklang (51 girls) and Salam (49 girls) was completed. The distribution items were Dino Shake 200 gm- 1 packet, Chana 1 kg- 1 packet, Soyabean 1 kg- 1 packet, Dabur Glucose, 500gm-1 packet and Eggs (30 pieces)- 1 plate respectively.

CHILDREN PROGRAMS

One program on Children drawing activity organized at Thaoroijam village on 21st of May, 2023 with 16 participants (8-14 yrs). Children displayed their emotional and mental expression in the form of drawing about the current chaos and turmoil situation in Manipur.

An exposure tour was also organized by the team on dated 20th August, 2023 at Langthabal (Imphal West district) for the children of Maklang (51 participant) and Salam (45 participant) of the Soccer team to provide a relief from the tense situation and boosting their energy & confidence level thereby to develop physically, mentally and socially sound and strong. A friendly Soccer match was also held at the Salam Kangjeibung on dated 27th of August, 2023. One Days Health Camps were also organized with the initiative of CRY at Maklang Village (125 participant) on dated 27th of August, 2023 and at Ngairangbam Village (130 participants) on 10th of September, 2023. A pilot batch of different classical form of dance session has been taken up by the team once in a week in the **Remedial centers.** Its objectives are to teach the children the underlying values like discipline, consistency, coordination, synchronization, good posture and also a stress buster and relief mechanism. It also improves their physical health, emotional expressions and stamina providing an overall development and mental wellbeing. During this quarter, the organization took a great initiative to provide a numbers of distribution program in the various Relief Camps in the State. Also, distribution of the necessary dietary supplements for the Soccer teams in Maklang and Salam Village.





A BRIEF REPORT ON CREATIVE LEARNING PROGRAME

On 12nd March 2024, a creative learning program was organized at Wide Angle Office. The program was participated by the six teachers of Remedial Centres and the four staffs of CRY. The program was facilitated by Khuraijam Dhoni Devi (teacher, K.V. School) and organized with the objective to orient the remedial teacher on classroom teaching process. The program highlights the different steps and techniques to teach student and how to create a classroom like environment at any given places. The remedial teachers were very eager to learn and re learn new things to further impart the knowledge to the students. At the end of the program, the teachers were made to give a short presentation each on how to conduct an appropriate classroom teaching process.

A BRIEF REPORT ON CHILDREN COLLECTIVE

On the 27th of January, 2024 our team members, M.I.S Coordinator Rajkumari Lakshmirani, Donaldo Ahanthem Field Operating Officer, Meeky Maibam Field Operating Officer along with remedial teacher S. Nirmala went a simple children collective program at Ngairangbam Village. The simple program was organized by remedial teacher of Ngairangbam, Priyaluxmi Huidrom. 20 children participated in the children collective with 10 male children and 10 female children each. The children were made aware about the modules of Children Collective and KH TANOUBI was nominated as the president and N KELBINSON was nominated as the secretary of the CC. In addition to this, the children were given a brief life skills session following the CRY MODULES by Meeky Maibam Field Operating Officer. The children were also made to give a brief introduction about themselves highlighting their hobbies and talent.

M.I.S Coordinator Rajkumari Lakshmirani also interacted with a student named MOJESH, who is currently a displaced child due to the ethnic violence that broke out on the 3rd of May, 2023. With the help of remedial teacher Priyaluxmi, Mojesh and his younger sister are currently enrolled in SK IDEAL HIGH SCHOOL of Ngairangbam Village eventhough they are not from the locality. Mojesh is now staying at his maternal parent's house in Ngairangbam Village, after his home was burnt from the brutal incident. He is very thankful to remedial teacher Priyaluxmi for welcoming him whole heartedly and for letting him join the remedial classes.

On the same day, the 27th of January, 2024 our team also visited the Kachikhul Remedial Coaching Centre and formed a CHILDREN COLLECTIVE with 20 participants maintaining 10 male child and 10 female children following the same objectives. After this the team also visited Tharoijam remedial coaching centre and formed new child collective with 20 participants (10 male children and 10 female children) to boost their leadership abilities and management of lifeskills.

Orientation & Training Programs

Training and Orientation for capacity building and strengthening of the team for further action plan for the 2023-2024 was conducted at the premises of Wide-Angle Office Nanao Laishram (Project coordinator) on dated 1st and 3rd of June, 2023. The team was instructed for thrice a week for the month of July & August for training and Orientation.

Moreover, training and orientation were conducted thrice a week at the WA Office in the form of capacity building of the team to enhance their learning and to strengthen the working skills to provide the necessary action plan for the development and progress of the children, awareness and sensitization of the villagers in the operational areas. A revision of the CRY Modules of life skill was again done for the team and it really helped the team in conducting the life skills training at the centers by the center teacher and also in various relief camps opened at the operational areas. The details are.....

- 1) Revision of the project, road mapping, important abbreviation of the related words to the project. Also, a capacity building of the team was conducted trice a week in the month of July by Nanao Laishram. (Project Coordinator)
- 2) On dated 19th of August, 2023, an orientation was conducted by Madam Baby Haobam (CWC) for building a child friendly approached and conversation while dealing with the children at the centers. She also gave a briefing of maintaining intact

form/ child profile which will not only maintaining the records and details but also for a smooth running of the CRY program and activities related in future.

- 3) On 26th of August, 2023, sharing of ideas, experiences and different working styles of the team which would help in enhancing the growth and performance of the team in the future.
- 4) On 27th August, 2023, training session for the arrangement of the Health Camp with the assignment of duties to each staff for the success of the said program by the Secretary, Montu Ahanthem of the Wide-Angle Social Development Organization.
- 5) On dated 30th of August, 2023, a briefing and discussion on Child protection & issues like POCSO, adoption rules, RTE, their legal terms and procedures was again taken by the Secretary himself, Sir Montu Ahanthem.
- 6) On dated 16th of September, 2023, brainstorming session and capacity building of the team was conducted by Jenita Rajukumari (M.I.S Coordinator)

Three days training program on Psycho-social care and Support for volunteers of Relief Camps was organized by India Peace Centre, Nagpur at the conference hall of wide-angle social development organisation from 11st of January to 13th January, 2024. And our team participated in the said program. The highlights of the program are

- 1) Identification of Mental Problem/Issues
- 2) Understanding Trauma
- 3) Psychological Effects of Trauma
- 4) Basic communication skills
- 5) Understanding emotions
- 6) Art activities for emotional expression
- 7) Substance use and its preventive measures
- 8) Life skills
- 9) Continuation of Life Skills
- 10) Relaxation and feedback

Meetings with Stakeholders, SMC

4 stakeholders' meetings were held with the objectives for bridging the gaps of the children in the operational areas through opening of remedial coaching center and discussed on the present situation where children affected by closing of schools. Local stakeholders will initiate to identify the children from their respective villages as done previous year. The list of the meetings is-----

10 School meetings were conducted at the premises of the concerned School authority for taking the pending signatures in mainstreaming certificates of the children.

During the second quarter, meetings with the Stakeholders including the VCPCs are so busy in opening and operating relief camps, the urgent needs of displaced people they concerned, and to update to the government official (DICTRICT COMMISSIONER) every day and seek support to the individuals, donor agencies, CBOs etc. such as foods, clothes, play materials for children etc. The VCPC of New Keithelmanbi, Moidangpok, Maklang, Yurembam Ideal Girls' School, konthoujam Makha, Khabam High school, Yangngapokpi High School, Joypur Khul Lower Primary School, Recent Hr. Secondary School, Khabamdiar Junior High School, Phayeng high school, Phayeng youth Club, Phayeng Ching khuman, and Langjing Achouba, Old Age Home respectively taking initiative for the inmates needs in the relief camps.

12 Meetings with details are highlighted below-----

 Maklang Village-On dated 5th of July,2023, meeting with Haobijam Manichand (Club Secretary), Laishram Bijoy (SMC) and Moirangthem Indrakumar (In charge of Maklang Relief Camp) for fixing the life skills training session in the Maklang Relief camp and other agendas.

- 2) Heinoubok village- On dated 17th of July, 2023, Meeting with Loktongbam Bipin Singh (Club Secretary) of YCWO with the objectives of doing a life skill training session with enrolled and unenrolled children in remedial coaching from the village. The team highlighted the importance of learning and sensitizing the children of it. in the village.
- 3) Kachi Khul Village- On dated 10th and 15th of July, 2023, Meeting with Iboyaima(Club President) and Samjai (Club member) regarding good cooperation and coordination whenever required in the best interest of children in their village.
- 4) Maklang Village- On dated 18th and 24th of August, 2023, meeting with Haobijam Manichand(Club Secretary)of Maklang Youth Development Club and Laishram Bijoy (SMC) for the coming "One Day Exposure Tour" on dated 20th of August, 2023 at Manipur Science Centre in Lanthabal(Imphal west district) and also for the "One Day Health Camp" at Maklang Community Hall on 27th of August, 2023.
- 5) Heinoubok village- On dated 20th of August, 2023, meeting with Loktongbam Bipin Singh (Club Secretary), T. Bogin (Panchayat Member), Th. Tijen (SMC Convenor), Th. Sonachand (Club Member), S. Dilip (Club Member) and K. Nishikanta Singh (Club treasurer) of YCWO informing the date of the life skill training session of both enrolled and unenrolled children of the village on dated 24th of August, 2023 and requesting them for club publicity.
- 6) Salam Village- On dated 13th, 16th and 22nd of August, 2023, meeting with the VCPCsand SMCs member of the village regarding the changing of School Address of Western Standard High School, Thaoroijam to Salam, upgrading of the school building and building of school's hostels. The number of participants were 18 including the AGW, ASHAs worker, Meira paibies and parents. Also meeting with local stakeholders and youth to inform the coming "Friendly Soccer Match" on dated 27th of August, 2023 at Salam Kanjeibung(Playground) for cooperation.
- 7) Patsoi Part III Village- On dated 10th of September,2023, telephonic conversation with Dhana (Club member) and Devika (RILM teacher) for fixing the date of life skill session with the children collective.
- 8) Taobungkhok Village- On dated 13th of September, 2023, telephonic conversation with Thoiba (club member and RILM teacher) to fix date for life skill session with the children collective.

VCPC MEETING

On **20th of November, 2023** a short meet up was held with Yumnam Bipin, secretary of VCPC, Maklang along with Remedial Teacher of Maklang, Nirmala to discuss about the Maklang Girls Soccer Team on how long the soccer program will continue and the impact of the soccer program on the girls.

SMC Meeting

2 stakeholder's meetings were held at Heinoupok Village and Ngairangbam Village with the objectives to situate the level of teachings of the schools and look upon the functioning of the school to re-locate whether it meets the criteria for RIGHT TO EDUCTION. The lists of the meetings are as follows:

- a) Meeting with the headmaster of Heinoupok Primary, Sir Khaba and the staffs of the primary school with Soubam Ranjita Devi (Remedial Teacher) along with our CRY staffs headed by Project Coordinator Jenita Rajkumari.
- b) Meeting with the headmaster of SK Ideal High School, Sir Babudhon of Ngairangbam village along with Kh. Ingocha Singh (Club President), Priyaluxmi Huidrom (Remedial Teacher) with our staffs headed by Montu Ahanthem, Secretary of Wide-Angle Social Development Organisation.

3 SMC MEETINGS WERE HELD FOR THE LAST QUARTER

One stakeholder's meeting was held at Tharoijam Village on 6th of January, 2024 with the aim to enquire about the functioning and modality of the Tharoijam Primary School and interact more about the conditions of the students. Our team headed by project coordinator Jenita Rajkumari and other staffs went for the visit. Remedial teacher PH Premila, organized the meeting along with the help of our CRY team. Our team interacted with the Chairman of SMC, Ph. Muhindro along with some staffs of Tharoijam Primary School and discuss about the RIGHT TO EDUCATION and mid-day meal scheme of the students.

One stakeholder's meeting was held at Yurembam Village on 8th of February, 2024. The meeting was held with the aim to check the regularization of children going to schools amidst the chaos. The meeting was held at Yurembam High School. The meeting was headed by project coordinator Jenita Rajkumari and MIS Coordinator Lakshmirani Rajkumari, two field operating officers Meeky Salam and Donaldo Ahanthem. Our team interacted with the Headmaster Nilakanta and teacher Bishorjit Leishangthem for mainstreaming the students and inquire about dropouts and laggard students.

A brief SMC meeting was held on the 7th of March, 2024 at Maklang Makha Leikai High School. The meeting was held with 15 participants along with Lukram Leimahan, Pradhan and L. Bijoy teacher of Maklang High School and with the team members of CRY. The meeting was also participated by club secretary and president, parents of children from remedial centers, and members of AWW. The main objective of the meeting was to discuss the impacts of the ongoing crisis to the students and children of Maklang village as Maklang is close to the border regions of the crisis. Mainly, the uncertainties prevailing to the current law and order situations and how is it affecting the dreams and aspirations of the students are discussed. The parents shared how difficult it is for them to support the education of their children and their hurdles in trying to motivate the young minds during this tough time. Our team project coordinator, Jenita Rajkumari thanked the parents for not giving up and for supporting their children inspite of the series of challenges faced by them. The parents and the other participants were very grateful to the cry team for organizing such an interaction program. They further added that the remedial coaching classes were of immense help to the students to divert from the prevailing chaos and to provide a space to study and interact with their friends.

Four VCPC meetings were held for the last quarter

One VCPC meeting was held on Sunday, the 10th of January, 2024 at Tharoijam Village. Our team headed by Project Coordinator Jenita Rajkumari and other staffs along with Remedial Teacher Ph Premila had a meeting which included Thoudam Dijamani (Pradhan), Club Secretary, Club member, AWW members and few parents of children who are currently enrolled under remedial coaching classes of Tharoijam centre. The topic of the meeting was on the welfare of the children to cope up with the present extreme situation. In addition to this, the discussion also included about the moral and psychological support to the parents so that they are capable of understanding their emotions and psychology of their children.

3 VCPC meetings were held at Heinoubok, Ngairangbam and Kachikhul Village on dated 10th February, 12th February and 25th February respectively. Our team headed by Project Coordinator Jenita Rajkumari and other staffs including MIS Coordinator Lakshmirani Rajkumari, two field operating officers Meeky Salam and Donaldo Ahanthem went for the meetings. The meetings were facilitated by the concerned centre teachers from our remedial coaching classes, namely Johnson for Kachikhul Village, Priyaluxmi Huidrom for Ngairangbam Village and Soubam Ranjita for Heinoubok village. The meeting included parents, Pradhans of respective villages, club secretaries, ASHA workers, Anganwadi workers and members of respective localities. The meetings were attended by 15 participants for Heinoupok, 20 participants for Ngairangbam and 15 participants for Kachikhul Village. The main concern of the interactive meetings was on the holistic well-being of the children, in terms of their physical, mental and psychological to cope up with the present extreme situation. Moreover, another main objective of the meetings was to ensure the importance of village child protection unit of each village of our operational areas keeping in mind the present chaotic and uncertain law and order situation of the state that has been happening since the violence broke out on 3rd May'2023. Project Coordinator, Jenita Rajkumari highlighted the roles of VCPC and how the smooth functioning of the unit will prevent Child Labour, Child Trafficking in this extreme chaotic situation. Additionally, the members of VCPC and our team members interacted and advise the parents that take part in the meeting about how their children are coping up with their education in this tough time. Two schools are being shut down in Kachikhul Village and the students and children had been displaced and fled to other parts of greater Imphal region as a result of this consequences, our team highlighted the importance of having meeting as such.

Meetings with Statutory Bodies

Two meetings were conducted for this year with the owner of the Hope Home (CCI) and some CWC in the operational areas of Imphal West District as a follow up concerning about the CNCP for their further safety and protection. Children were sent back with their parents at their homes with the consent of the CWC.

On Dated 5th and 17th of February, 2023, 28th of March, 2024- Meeting with Hon'ble Chairperson, Madam Geetabali Sanasam, CWC, Imphal West District regarding the situation & condition of the children in the operational areas. Also, about the challenges faced and services provided in spite of the challenges due to the conflict in the State.

On dated 28th of March, and 3rd April, 2024- Meeting with the Bijay Kumar and Sangita JJB Member, Imphal West District and Nanao Laishram, JJB Member, Noney District also former Project Coordinator (CRY) regarding the increasing vulnerability of CCL. They had confirmed that the increasing number of CCL was merely because of early elopement issue in adolescence which converted into POCSO and also due to the civil unrest where adolescent boys started participating in the conflict as village volunteers, bandhs and protesting for a solution and call for peace in the State.

A short report on the protection and safety measures of the children

An initiative and great efforts were taken up by the team specially for the safety and protection of the children staying in the CCI and Observation Home in the operational areas of Imphal West District of Manipur due to the chaotic and disturbing situation of the State. A frequent telephonic conversation and visits were taken for the past 2 months with the owner of the CCI in Imphal West District to follow up the condition of the children due to prevailing situation of the State. Initiation taken up by the team in close coordination with the CCIs thereby 18 children(boys) from Observation Home located at Takyel near the Head Office of Wide Angle and 8 Children (girls) from Observation Home, Langthabal were rescued from the sensitive situation staying in the Observation Home and were deported to 1st MR Ground with State Police personnels with the permission of the State authority for their safety and protection

Challenges faced by the team due to Curfew and Internet Ban

The team faced huge challenges in the preparation of mainstreaming certificates as all the schools were shut down and curfew were imposed. However, the team initiated through telephonic conversation in entering the data and completing the tasks in a short duration of the relaxed in curfew hours from time to time. Also, the banning of the internet facilities hampered the working process as uploading was not possible. The team also faced lots of challenges during the short curfew relaxation as most of the roads were blocked because of the reason of coming and going and also because of the sit in protest and peace demonstration observed in the roads by the local Meira paibis. It was also very difficult to fix a date and meeting the School Authority as schools were shut down completely. The appointment of fixing the date and going to meet the SMC in their respective dwelling places for signatures were a big challenge faced by the teachers. The seniors took a great initiative in completing the mainstreaming tasks by going to internet accessible areas like Government offices, DC, hospitals and banks etc to upload the files.

A Short Report on Remedial Coaching

In spite of the curfew and chaotic situation of the State, Manipur, the team took great initiative and great efforts in identifying 430 children from different villages under drop outs, laggard and weak in study in the operational areas of Imphal West District of Manipur. Children were already affected their learning process due to Covid for the last 2 years and now the prevailing situation of the State further hampered their academic career resulted in a huge learning gap. This is worst for the vulnerable children of the vulnerable families in the sensitive areas. Moreover, the total shut down of the schools and absence of teaching learning process break, the frequent sounds of the siren, tear gas and mock bombs, news of gun firings, burning of houses, loss of lives break down their Morales with doubts, an insecure and disturbing environment. With close coordination with the VCPC and the teachers, these children were taking education with a break in between due to curfew at the remedial coaching centers. They were also provided with basic life skills to boost their Morales and confidence in this chaotic situation.

A short report on life skill sessions

The team took life skills sessions to boost the energy and provide a relief from all negativity environment and emotions thereby building a balance and healthy emotions and to navigate their life. The details are.....

- 1) Maklang village- On dated 9th and 15th of July, 2023, a life skill training was conducted at Maklang Relief Camp to the inmates who were displaced from their respective houses due to the current situation of the State with 25 children and 27 children respectively on the said dates. All the Cry Modules on Life Skill training with the topics of Self-Empowerment Skill, Proactive Thinking, Emotional Awareness Skill, Communication Skill were done. On dated 22nd of July, 2023, training was also conducted at the remedial coaching center by Nirmala (Remedial Teacher). The number of participants were 29 children.
- Keithelmanbi Village- On dated 18th and 24th of July, 2023, life skill training was conducted at Wisdom Palace Camp for the displaced people staying at the camps. The number of participants were 22 children and 24 children respectively on the said dates.
- 3) Heinoubok Village- On dated 24th of August, 2023, life skill session was conducted by Meeky Salam (Field Operating Officer) along with Sanoujam Ranjita (Remedial Teacher) with 20 participants which included 5 boys and 15 girls altogether.
- Patsoi Part III village- On dated 14th of September, 2023, life skill session was conducted on the CRY MODULE of Self-Empowerment skills with 12 participants of 8 girls and 4 boys.
- 5) Taobungkhok Village- On dated 17th of September, 2023, life skills session was conducted CRY MODULE of Self-Empowerment skills with 15 participants of 9 girls and 6 boys.
- Life skill sessions were conducted on dated 28th and 29th of September, 2023 at Salam (33 girls) and Maklang (45 girls) Village respectively with the Soccer teams.
- 7) In the current prevailing situation of the State, the provision of life skills training has become an essential necessity. Our team has taken the proactive step of offering this training to empower children, boost their morale and provide relief from the prevailing traumatic environment. One Life skill training sessions was held for this quarter at
- 8) Maklang village- On Sunday, the 8th of October 2023, a life skill session was conducted by Meeky Salam (Field Operating Officer) along with Ahongsangbam Nirmala (Remedial Teacher), Ahanthem Donaldo (Field Operating Officer) with 38 participants from the Maklang Soccer Team. Remedial Teacher, Ph. Premila also assisted the training session. The life skill session ended with a lunch program with the children and the team.
- 9) 4 Life Skills Session were held at Thaoroijam Village, Salam Village, Kachikhul Village and Ngairangbam Village on dated 2nd Feb, 8th Feb, 15th Feb and 17th Feb, 2024 respectively on the four CRY MODULES viz. Self-Empowerment Skills, Proactive Thinking Skills, Emotional Intelligence Skills, Communication Skills. Field

Coordinator Meeky Salam focus on the Proactive Thinking Skills highlighting the importance of positive thinking during this chaotic situation. He mentioned the importance of meditating and taught breathing techniques to the children to stay calm when they are facing trouble or feeling anxious. The sessions started by letting the children give self-introduction mentioning their hobbies and interests' area. The children were made to recite poems, draw their favorite sceneries and tell a story. Some children even sang the State Song "SANA LEIBAK MANIPUR" showing the love for their motherland. The sessions ended with a light refreshment

It also helped them to understand the underlying values like discipline, consistency, coordination, synchronization, good posture etc. It also improves their physical health, emotional expressions and stamina providing an overall development and mental wellbeing. It is also a medium to find out the hidden talents in children which they were not aware of it and also helping them to understand and nurture their passions, guidance to enhance their learning growth.

A Short Report on One Day Advocacy Meeting for Stakeholders

A "One Day Advocacy Meeting for Like Minded Stakeholders on State Policy, Child Rights Issues, Our Roles and Responsibilities" was held on Saturday, the 28th of October, 2023 at Sagolband Moirang Hanuba Leirak, Imphal, organized by Wide Angle Social Development Organisation, supported by CRY (Child Rights and You). The program was attended by After all the invited dignitaries have arrived, the program started with the welcome remarks and key note address from Jenita Rajkumari, Project Coordinator- CRY where she highlighted that the present situation starting from the 3rd of May exhibited an extraordinary situation which resulted in extraordinary human tragedy specially to Women and Children. She added that children are the future pillar of the society, and yet in our present situation children appear to be the most neglected segment of our society, with the rights of a child being ignored. And therefore, she said that there is a need to ensure our children's right. The programme was attended by five resource persons. Former Chairperson of Manipur Commission for the Protection of Child Rights, S. Sharat Kumar Sharma graced the program as the Chief Guest. Khumukcham Rinku, Editor Imphal Times graced the program as the Guest of Honour. Montu Ahanthem, Secretary Wide Angle Social Development Organization presided as the President of the function. Keisham Pradip Kumar Former Member Manipur Commission for the protection of child rights and Thiyam Rajkeshor Former Member Child Welfare Committee graced the function as the resource persons. The function was attended

by members of CWC (Child Welfare Committee) Imphal East, Ukhrul, Tamenglong, JJB (Juvenile Justice Board) Noney, Tengnaopal, Imphal East, DCPU (District Child Protection Unit) Imphal West, CCI (Child Care Institute) Nirvana Foundation.

Khumuchcham Rinku - Editor Imphal Times spoke as the Guest of Honor and highlighted that whether the Manipur Government has any children's Policy. He further highlighted the need for convergence in the implementation in various schemes is various department from the down level to the highest level of authority. S. Sarat Kumar Sharma - Former Chairperson - Manipur Commission for Protection of Child Rights, He opined that the State Policy of Children need to implemented as soon as possible in the current situation of the State, if there is a need of any amendment it could be done as per requirement later because a strong mechanism with legal authority is required. Montu Ahanthem - Secretary Wide Angle Social Development Organization, wrapped up the program by highlighting the need for a convergence between different govt. department and agencies so that the children in the relief camps are benefited.

The first technical session was taken by Keisham Pradip Kumar, Former Member Manipur Commission for the Protection of Child Rights spoke on the topic "Draft State Policy on Children- Present Relevance'. He explained the need of the State Policy on Child Rights at this very juncture where children are suffering the most, He elaborated on the three important tiers of the policy, Accountability, Convergence and Psychosocial wellbeing of the children. He also explained the three main rights of children, Right to Development, Right to Survival, Right to Protection and Right to Participation. The second speaker Thiyam Rajkeshor, Former Chairperson of Child Welfare Committee, Imphal spoke on the topic, " Role of State Institution Working on Children". 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A Short Report on CRY Evaluation

On Friday, the 13th of October, 2023 the quarterly evaluation of CRY to. The evaluation was conducted by Anindita Mukherjee, Senior Manager CRY (Child Rights and You) and was attended by Montu Ahanthem (Secretary, Wide Angle Social Development Organisation) along with 11 staffs. The evaluation started with a discussion with Montu Ahanthem and Anindita Mukherjee about the ongoing unstable law and order situation of Manipur. As a result of the situation of Manipur, the evaluation team was not able to be present offline. hence the evaluation took place online at the residence of Montu Ahanthem. The evaluation started with the introduction of the whole team. The discussion prioritizes more on the situation of the children which is directly and indirectly affected by the ethnic violence. Montu Ahanthem clearly defined the data of children affected and displaced by the violence and shared a bit on how the violence had erupted. On further discussion, Project Coordinator Jenita Rajkumari explained about the actions and activities taken up the team during the past months explaining more on the six centres which were intervened by the team. The discussion carried on with stories of children from Remedial Teacher of Tharojiam Centre, Ph. Premila where she shared about children who had to be displaced from their homes as a result of the violence. Following the discussions, M.I.S Coordinator Rajkumari Lakshmirani shared about the stories of girl soccer players of Maklang and Salam Team focusing more on their challenges in joining the Soccer Project. The main highlight of the discussion was on the activity of Dance Class held by Donaldo Ahanthem (Field Operating Officer). Anindita was happy to hear about the news that with the initiation of the dance class, students' attendance was rising more than before. She mentioned about the introduction of a new provision of the cultural aspects of the children.

A Short Report on One Day Training Program of Kitchen Garden



Two programs on the topic, "One Day Training Program on Sustainable Livelihood and Development Through Kitchen Gardening" were held at two villages. One on the 7TH of November, 2023 at the Salam Community Hall and 19th of November, 2023 at Ngairangbam Village, Imphal West organized by Wide Angle Social Development Organisation and Supported by CRY (Child Rights & You). The targeted beneficiaries of the two programs are village house wives. For the two programs, the training was undertaken, Shri Th. David Singh Associate professor NIT (National Institute of Technology) and about 50 local women villagers from local Maklang, Salam, Tharoijam, Heinoubok and Ngairangbam Villages took part in the two programs. Jenita Rajkumari, Project Coordinator started the program by giving welcome remarks for both the programs and was followed by Montu Ahanthem Secretary Wide Angle Social Development Organization who started the program by highlighting the topic of the programme. He explained the literal meaning of kitchen garden to the let the local villagers understand in local dialect., he says "Let us first understand the meaning of today's topic and not confused with what it wants to convey. Kitchen Garden simply means "Hingol Koiba". To let the elderly people understand, he explained the literal meaning of the topic. He also explained how kitchen Garden is essential for every household to sustain livelihood and elaborated how Kitchen Garden has been an integral part of local households since time immemorial.

David Singh, an Associate Professor at the National Institute of Technology (NIT), emphasized the significance of cultivating locally available vegetables in the upcoming season. Addressing the audience, he undermined the importance of using locally available organic fertilizers and pest control methods. Commencing his speech with a personal touch, Singh shared his passion for gardening, mentioning his early interest and the constraints of limited space at his own residence.

After marriage, he fulfilled his dream of gardening at his wife's house. Singh explained the pivotal role of Kitchen Gardening in maintaining a sustainable livelihood. He emphasized that individuals initially focus on sustaining their kitchen gardens before considering surplus production for sale. Singh also highlighted the importance of biodegradable waste through vermi-compost, detailing how most leaves, except those of Eucalyptus globulus (due to its oil content), can be converted into valuable manure. Singh expressed his opinion that soil quality is paramount in gardening, emphasizing the critical step of identifying suitable soil. He warned against poorly prepared soil, which can become hard and rigid, adversely affecting plant growth. Stressing the importance of water management, he noted that while plants may wither with insufficient water, excess water poses a greater risk to their survival. He advocated for "well-drained soil" as the most favourable type for growing vegetables. Further, Singh suggested that the presence of "Australian Earthworms," approximately 4 inches in length, indicates fertile soil for vegetable cultivation. Sharing insights into natural insecticides, he mentioned that ethanol can be produced at home through the fermentation of cooked rice. Additionally, he recommended a combination of curd and water, along with diluted cow urine, as effective insecticides.

Concluding the program, Singh demonstrated the process of planting vegetables in a pot, showcasing the importance of refined soil. Both of the events concluded with a vote of thanks from the M.I.S Coordinator, Lakshmirani Rajkumari. The programs were followed by a light refreshment and lunch program.

A Short Report on Celebration of Children's Day

On the occasion of Children's Day, the team headed by Project Coordinator Jenita Rajkumari along with M.I.S Lakshmirani Rajkumari and two field operating officers Donaldo Ahanthem and Meeky Maibam visited the children six centres namely Kachikhul, Ngairangbam, Salam, Maklang, Tharoijam and Heinoubok with the purpose of bringing joy and support to the children amidst the chaotic situation of the State. The team generously distributed stationary items along with chocolates and sweet to the children at each centre. Beyond material gifts, the team engaged in a meaningful interaction program with the children. This session aimed to understand the challenges that the children faced and explore the positive outcomes of the remedial coaching that they received. In this heartwarming exchange, the children expressed their affection for the dedicated remedial teachers and their genuine enthusiasm for attending the coaching session. The team's effort extended beyond the material gifts, fostering a connection and understanding of the children's experiences. The centre teachers, narrated the story of **Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru** expressing his love for children that made his birthday as Children's Day. At the Maklang Remedial Centre, a special highlight unfolded as the children showcased their talents in a cultural dance. Anticipating the performance, they eagerly waited for their dance teacher and field operating officer Donaldo Ahanthem to play the Dholop. The rhythmic dance, adorned in traditional *Phanek* attire, added a cultural dance to the occasion, creating lasting memories for both the team and the children.

Overall, the celebration encapsulated the spirit of Children's Day by combining material support with emotional connection and cultural celebration, creating a memorable experience of happiness and laughter.



OBESERVANCE OF WORLD AID'S DAY

The "World Aid's Day" was observed on 1st of December, 2023 at the office of Wide-Angle Social Development Organisation under the theme "Let Communities Lead". Montu Ahanthem, Secretary of Wide-Angle Social Development Organisation and shared his experience and journey of leading a project on TI project known as target and intervention in the lives of AIDs and HIV Positive patients to provide them welfare and support them. The program was participated by 35 people and it ended with a lunch program.

SUPPORTING ADOLESCENTS IN ENHANCING THEIR COPING MECHANISMS THROUGH SPORTS FOR DEVELOPMENT

In collaboration with UNICEF and CRY, the team had distributed sports items with the theme to support youths in enhancing their coping mechanism through sports for development. The team had distributed sports items to 20 Relief Camps of Kangpokpi District, 20 relief camps of Churachandpur District, 15 relief camps each from Imphal East District and I4 relief camps from Bishnupur District. All together the team had distributed sports materials to 69 relief camps. Our team was not able to distribute the items to one of the relief camps from Bishnupur District which was in the name of list of relief camps given by the UNICEF team, called Assembly of God as there was not relief camp under this name. The children from each relief camps were elated and in extreme joy to receive the items. They couldn't wait when the volunteers distributed the items, and hurriedly took out the skipping rope and started playing.

Some children from relief camps asked if the team could also distribute winter clothes. The children shared that; in summer it was okay if their clothes were burnt along with their house, they didn't have much problem. However, in winter season as the cold wind sweeps in early morning and late nights, they faced difficulties as they do not have enough winter clothes. They even said that they suffer from cold and flu as they are exposed to cold weather conditions.



FRIENDLY SOCCER MATCH

A Friendly football match was organized by the team between the child inmates of Oinam Government High School and Leimaram Government High School of Bishnupur District on Sunday, the 24th of December 2023. The volunteers from the relief camps provided a huge helping hand to the team from scratch to perform a well-organized and oriented match between the two-football team. The friendly match was organized in partial fulfillment of the distribution of the sports items to the children of relief camps by CRY (Child Rights and You) in collaboration with UNICEF with the theme. There were 14 participants each from Oinam Relief Camp and Leimaram Relief camp. Montu Ahanthem, State Consultant CRY and Project Coordinator CRY, Jenita Rajkumari encouraged both the teams with handshakes before the match started. Oinam Team scored one goal just as the match started, the crowd was overwhelmed by the great professional nature of the players. The match continued to play for 90 minutes and ended with a score of 4-1 i.e., Team Oinam scored the friendly match

with 4 goals and L Leimaram Team scored only one goal. Our organizing committee provided the players with light refreshment (boiled egg and smooch) after the match ended. In addition to this, the players along with the volunteers from the relief camps were given a hearty lunch to commemorate the fruitful match.

Similarly, on the same day, i.e the 24th of Sunday another friendly match was organized between the child inmates from the relief camps of Sawombung Fabricated house and Biramangol college of Imphal West District. The match followed the same procedure like the Bishnupur District match. Biramangol college won the match with two goals and unfortunately, Sawombung Fabricated house could not score any goals.



A SHORT REPORT ON RELIEF CAMP VISIT

On 28th of December, 2023 our staffs headed by Montu Ahanthem, State in charge CRY along with Jenita Rajkumari, Project Coordinator CRY, Meeky Maibam, Field Operating Officer, Donaldo Ahanthem, Field Operating Officer and two remedial teachers, Ah. Nirmala and Soibam Ranjita guided Mr Hemanta Borah, Program Manager – North East (CONSULTANT) in visiting the relief camps of Imphal East, District. The team visited three relief camps viz., Nongada Relief Camp, Andro Schedule Caste Girls' Hostel and Yairipok Yambem High School Relief Camp. The teams interacted with the volunteers of the relief camps and asked about the current situation of the camps in terms of food and shelter. The inmates shared about the difficulties they faced during the harsh weather condition. They were not satisfied with only two meals provided to them. The inmates asked the team to donate them winter clothes as January, the coldest month is approaching.

WORKSHOPS ON DIGITAL LITERACY

A one-day workshop on the topic "Digital Literacy was held on the 27th of December, 2023 at Biramangol College Sawonmbung, Imphal East District. The main propose of the workshop was to sensitise the Youths living in the Relief Camps on Digital Literacy. The session was facilitated by Mr Hemanta Borah, Program Manager – North East (CONSULTANT) Deputed for UNICEF's Passport to Earning Program and the program was attended by 93 participants from the relief camps of Biramangol College, Sajiwa Relief Camp, Nongada Relief Camp and Sawombung Shelter Home Relief Camp. Among the participants, people who brought cell phones were registered under the link https://unicef.myp2e.org/ . The session was guided by MR HEMANTA BORAH and the participants who had registered under the p2e program, received a certificate both on financial literacy and digital literacy.

The program was hosted by MIS Coordinator, Rajkumari Lakshmirani. The workshop started with an inaugural function and it was attended by four resource persons, namely: Keisham Pradip Kumar Chairperson Manipur Commission for the Protection of Child Rights, Eliza Maisnam Principal, Royal Academy of Law, Oinam, Jugeshwar Irengbam, Secretary, Royal Academy of Law, HEMANTA BORAH, Program Manager – North East (CONSULTANT) Deputed for UNICEF's Passport to Earning Program and Montu Ahanthem Former Member of MCPCR and State in charge CRY. Jugeshwar Irengbam, Secretary, Royal Academy of Law, spoke as the president of the function. He highlighted the current situation and draws upon the extreme conditions the people of relief camps are experiencing as a result of the violence that happened on 3rd May, 2023. He thanked UNICEF and CRY for organizing a workshop which will digitally empower the youths of relief camp as it will provide them an opportunity in their career in this digital world.

The technical session started from 11 am and was undertaken by Hemanta Borah, Program Manager – North East and it was assisted by the Meeky Maibam, Field Operating Officer and Rajkumari Lakshmirani, MIS Coordinator. The participants were served with tea, sandwich and followed by a proper Meitei lunch.

The workshop ended with vote of thanks from Jenita Rajkumari, (Project Coordinator CRY).



A SHORT REPORT ON OBESERVANCE OF 40TH FOUNDATION DAY OF WIDE-ANGLE SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT ORGANISATION

The 40th foundation day of wide-angle social development organization was held on the 5th of December, 2024 at the conference hall of the office. Sarat Kumar Sharma, Former Chairperson Manipur Commission for the Protection of Child Rights as the chief guest, Keisham Pradip Kumar, Chairperson Manipur Commission for the Protection of Child Rights as the guest of honor, Montu Ahanthem Former Member of MCPCR and Secretary Wide Angle Social Development Organization as the guest of honor and Arambam Surjakumar President of Wide Angle Social Development Organization as the president of the program. The welcome address was given by Montu Ahanthem. He briefed about the initial establishment of the organization and the challenges he faced, how the office originated from a small rented room and the struggles he faced. Sarat Kumar suggested to publish the road map and Pamphlet of the organization and to establish a sustainable project free organization. Pradipkumar shared his gratefulness towards the organization and as the current chairperson of the Manipur Commission for the Protection of Child Rights, he briefly shared about his objective to provide a nutritious mid-day meal to the child inmates living in various relief camps. Project coordinator of CRY, Jenita Rajkumari also shared about her journey with the organization and how it shaped her career and dreams that aspired to serve for the vulnerable people and especially children. She also mentioned about the challenges and obstacles of the organization she heard and experienced. Moreover, in addition to this, field operating officer Meeky Maibam also shared the narratives of the evolution of the organization and the projects accomplishments the organization and the staffs had done. The short program was followed by a small hearty lunch. All the staffs of the organization and the participants of the program chatted about the evolution of the organization and the success and accomplishments it had made so far.

BRIEF REPORT ON PARTICIPATING REPUBLIC DAY PARADE

On the morning of 12nd January, 2024, the headmistress of 1st Manipur Rifles High School sent an application letter to the secretary of Wide-Angle Social Development Organization, requesting permission for 30 children currently enrolled in the remedial coaching center to participate in the upcoming Republic Day Parade which falls on January 26, 2024. The organization and the children were thrilled upon hearing this opportunity. It was a moment of "dreams do come true" for the children who were always looking forward to participate in such a reputed and prestigious occasion of the state as well as for the country. However, the team faced a series of challenges and obstacles in letting the children participate in the parade

due to the current law and order situation of the state which has been prevailing since the ethnic violence and ethnic cleansing broke out on the 3rd of May, 2024.

Initially, the team considered to select five children each from the currently operating remedial coaching centers so that it sums up to 30 children which was sought by the headmistress of the 1st MR High School. However, the team couldn't fulfill this criterion as it was nearly impossible to let the children from Maklang, Kachikhul, Ngairangbam centres to participate as the location of the children were very far from the practice ground of the parade. The children were very eager to join the parade but the parents of the children didn't want to let their child go to and froth for the practice as the distance of the practice ground was very far from their homes and the due to the current uncertain situation of frequent gun fires near the peripheral region and the sudden curfews and strikes of the state, the parents couldn't allow their children to join for the parade.

Nevertheless, remedial teachers Ph. Premila of Tharojiam Coaching Centre, Soubam Ranjita of Heinoubok Coaching Centre and along with the other teams of Wide Angle made an earnest effort to let the children participate. The two teachers along with the staffs headed by Project Coordinator Jenita Rajkumari went door to door to meet the parents of the children from Heinoubok village, Tharoijam village and Salam village to convince the parents of the children who were eager to participate in the parade. The team chose the children from these three centers as it was closer to the practice ground of the parade in comparison to the other three centers which are closer to the border regions of the violence. It is worth mentioning the hurdles the team had faced to convince the parents of children during this uncertain situation of the state. The team made home visit to each house of the children and explained about the procedures of the parade. The team shared that the 1st MR High School along with the Wide-Angle team will take full responsibilities of the children in terms of food and travelling of the children for practicing in the parade. The team made sure that the picked up and dropped off of the children will be made sure with proper care and even arranged a vehicle for them. With the great initiatives of the team, we managed to secure consents of 10 children from Tharoijam Village and 9 from Heinoubok village and 3 children from Salam Village.

From 13th January onwards, the children were picked up from their home early morning from 6 A.M for practicing March Parch under a skilled teacher. The children were thrilled at the first sight of hearing the drum beat of the teacher and lift up their legs for the parade. The early morning practice continued for two three days until a rumor was spread among the masses stating that "No one is allowed to participate in the Republic Day Parade and the state is to be observed a black day on the Republic Day as the masses felt that the Government of India is not considering Manipur as a State of India". Shortly upon hearing this unofficial notice, all the parents hesitated to send their children for practice and few children from Heinoubok didn't come for practice. The team had to reconvince parents, emphasizing the children's eagerness and the logistical challenges of reselecting students. Moreover, all the data of the 22 children had been submitted to the concerned authority and it will only create a chaos to remove them and re select other students. The team made an earnest effort to re convince their parents and made a verdict that the team will not let the children participate if the situation persists. Upon hearing this and seeing the eager faces of their, the children agreed to send their children at last.

Again, at the last moment our team faced a challenging situation when two children from Tharoijam Village suddenly dropped out at the morning of 23rd January, 2024 as there was an official meeting with the Meitei MLA's and ARAMBAI on the morning of 24th Jan, 2023 at Kangla Fort to discuss about the situation of the state and the steps that needs to be taken. The parents were worried that, an unplanned incident might break out in this conflicting

situation and it is better to let their children stay at home instead of sending them for practice. Our team failed to convince the parents of the two children as the situation was getting worse and only 20 children were participated for the parade.

From the morning of 23rd January, 2024, the final 20 children were made to stationed at the building of the 1st MR High School as there was a possibility of an uncertain situation happening on 24th Jan and it might provide a hindrance in travelling for the practice on the morning of 24th Jan. The children shared that they had a wonderful experience of sleeping over with their mates. On the morning of 25th of January, 2024 the children had a practice parade march. The children shared that they were over the moon and couldn't sleep as they were very excited about the D-Day they have been waiting and practicing eagerly for the past 15 days. On 26th January, 2024 our children made the march parch parade representing 1st Manipur Rifles High School and won the 1st Place. On 27th January, 2024, prize distribution program was held at the ground of 1st MR High School which was followed by a hearty luncheon. Our children were accompanied by our staffs and team for the prize distribution program and came back home in flying colors.

The headmistress has also given the opportunity to our remedial children who participated in the parade that they would be given free admission and fees to those children who wished to enroll in the 1st Manipur Rifles High School.



A SHORT REPORT ON SOCCER MATCH

A soccer match was held on **25th of February, 2024** at Salam. Around 50 participants from Maklang Soccer Team and Salam Soccer Team participated in the match. Two matches were held categorically. Firstly, under 17 match was held and team Salam won the match against team Maklang in 2-1. Reneka, won man of match of title for being an excellent striker in the field. The audience cheered her when she won the first goal. Following the 1st goal, she again scored her 2nd goal after playing for 5minutes. The field was filled with the cheers from the audience shouting for "RENEKA". Reneka gave high fives to her team mates who were exclaiming in joy. After a light refreshment session, under- 14 match was held. In this match, both the teams ended on a draw. During the match, both the teams showed great team works and enthusiasm. The young girls were never tired of running and passing the ball. The audience were also very thrilled to watch the younger girls playing happily and dearly. To participate in the soccer match, 18 girls from the Maklang and Salam Team who are currently staying in the Manipur Star Institute also came and join the match.

A BRIEF REPORT ON CREATIVE LEARNING PROGRAME

On 12nd March 2024, a creative learning program was organized at Wide Angle Office. The program was participated by the six teachers of Remedial Centres and the four staffs of CRY. The program was facilitated by Khuraijam Dhoni Devi (teacher, K.V. School) and organized with the objective to orient the remedial teacher on classroom teaching process. The program highlights the different steps and techniques to teach student and how to create a classroom like environment at any given places. The remedial teachers were very eager to learn and re learn new things to further impart the knowledge to the students. At the end of the program, the teachers were made to give a short presentation each on how to conduct an appropriate classroom teaching process.

A SHORT REPORT ON AWARNESS SESSION ON HIV AND AIDS

Remedial Teacher of Kachikhul, Johnson Ahongsangbam organized a simple awareness program at Kackhikhul Remedial Centre on the 9th of March, 2024. The awareness session was participated by 10 students from the remedial centre. Johnson gave the students' knowledge of HIV and Aids and how it is transmitted. He also highlighted the stigma perceived against the people who have HIV or AIDS. He further mentioned the worse disadvantages of using drugs and how to prevent using it if their peers started using it. CRY field operating officers, Donaldo Ahanthem and Meeky Maibam also participated in the session and guided the students in the right direction.

Report on Field Visits

During the second quarter, the two Field Operation Officers namely Maibam Meeky and Ahanthem Donaldo visited the Remedial Coaching centers 25 times as per work plan and if required for monitoring and coordinating the teachers in teaching of children in basic education and also for classroom transaction and the requirements of the centers and taking opportunities of meeting and interaction with the children and giving life skill sessions. They also met with the SMCs, VCPCs, parents, adolescents' children, club leaders, AWWs and ASHAs for time to time for capacity building, awareness and sensitization and also for further rapport build up, better understanding and coordination. The team also visited to interact and conduct life skills sessions as it is the need of the hour to provide them psychosocial supports, boost their confidence and energy level to divert their tensions, fear and depressions with Children Collective at Heinoubok, Patsoi Part III and Taobungkhok.

Remedial teachers Ah Nirmala and Soubam Ranjita went at the 15 relief camps of Imphal East District these following days.

23rd December, 2023: Remedial teachers, Priyaluxmi, Johnson Ah and Ph. Premila went to Oinam High School Ground of Bishnupur District to surveillance for the friendly soccer match which had to be organized on the 24th of December, 2023 and Remedial teachers Ah Nirmala and Soubam Ranjita went for a field visit to the Biramangol College field to check for the friendly soccer match which had to be organized on the 24th of December, 2023 and Remedial teachers Ab Nirmala and Soubam Ranjita went for a field visit to the Biramangol College field to check for the friendly soccer match which had to be organized on the 24th of December, 2023 between the inmates of the relief camps.

The parents were sensitizing about the importance of life skill session, cultural dance training every week in the Remedial Centers. give the information of life skill session and to send their wards for the life skill session. Also, awareness and sensitization of precautionary measures of Dengue fever.
- 2) Kachi Khul village-On dated 13th and 18th of July, 2023, meeting with 4 parents at their homes and informing them of sending their children at the remedial coaching center and informing them about the timing of teaching.

- 2) Ngairangbam Village- On dated 17th of October, 2023, meeting with 9 parents to give feedbacks of their children who attended remedial classes.
- 3) Salam Village- On dated **20th of October**, 2023, a telephonic interview was made to parents Th. Premjit and Th. Naobi and inquire about their child who was absent for the whole month.
- 4) Heinoubok Village- On dated **30th of October**, 2023, meeting with parents were held explaining about the impact of the unstable situation of the state and how important is to send their children at the remedial centres after an immense drop in the overall attendance performance of the children.

Meeting with Parents: Six parent's meetings were held for the month of November. The details of the meetings are as follows

1) Kachikhul Village- On, 7th November, 2023, meeting with 7 parents were made at the remedial center to discuss and advice the parents on the importance of preventing usage of drugs to children and give moral support about the children. They futher discuss on how they can prevent their children taking drugs and control the influence of their peers.

- 2) Ngairangbam Village- On dated **25th of** November, 2023, meeting with 2 parents from the relief camps of Heingang and Khurai who originally belonged to Pukhao Terapur, Imphal East District was done by the Remedial Teacher of Ngairangbam, Priyalaxmi Huidrom. The two mothers of the children used to be the locality of Ngairangbam. The parents came to meet remedial teacher of Ngairangbam, Priyalaxmi Huidrom to allow their children to join remedial classes. With the help of Priyalaxmi along with our team, four children were admitted at SK Ideal High School, Ngairangbam with the permission of the headmaster, Sir Babudhon.
- 3) Salam Village- On dated **23rd of November**, 2023, parents meeting with 15 participants was held to question about the low attendance of the children at remedial classes.
- 4) Heinoubok Village- On dated **22nd of November**, 2023, meeting with parents were held with 12 participants.
- 5) Maklang Village: **On 12nd November, 2023** three parents meeting was held with the parents of Phijam Benben, Phijam Ibetombi and Chabungbam Thoi to discuss about the low attendance.
- 6) Tharoijam Village- **On 27th of November, 2023** parents meeting with 20 participants were held at Tharoijam to discuss about the overall low attendance of the remedial children.

For this month, the discussions of the parent's meetings were about the low attendance of the children in remedial classes. As almost all the parents are farmers, they are occupied with the harvesting season and they weren't able to concentrate on their children.

Maklang Village: On **18th of December**, **2023** parents meeting with five participants namely Th. Ibomcha, Kh. Tomba, Ph. Suresh, Th. Bala and A. Sandhyarani was held at the Maklang remedial centre for the upcoming final examination. On **12nd of December**, **2023** parents meeting with three participants namely T. Rajen, L. Jugen and T. The team along with remedial teacher Ranjita made an earnest effort to convince the parents.
- 9) Maklang Village: On 2nd January, 2024 parents meeting with 5 participants were made by Remedial teacher Nirmala to discuss about their children who is currently staying in the boarding school of Manipur Star Institute for participating in KHELO INDIA. The parents wanted to inquire about the safety of their children who is staying at the boarding school. Two parents KH. SHANTIBALA AND KH TOMBA told remedial teacher Nirmala, that they want to take out their child, Kh Biju from the boarding school because they had the misconception and fear that the residence is surrounded by spirits and that Biju is possessed by spirits might harm their child and urge to take their child out of the boarding school. Paradoxically, A Sandhyarani, another parent thanked Nirmala, as their child Nandeshori, got to participate in the Khelo India and now she could play football like she had always wished.
- 10) Tharoijam Village- On 3rd of January, 2024 parents meeting with 13 participants was held at Tharoijam to discuss about the final exams of the students. On 12nd of January, door to door meetings with parents of children who wished to participate in the Republic Day parade held on 26th January, 2024 were made. The team along with remedial teacher PREMILA made an earnest effort to convince the parents.

Meeting with Parents: 3 parent's meetings were held for the month February. The details of the meetings are as follows

1) Kachikhul Village- On **dated 12nd February, 2024** two home visits were made by Remedial Teacher A Johnson. He met with Ahongshangbam Amarjit father of Lanthoiba and Ahongsangbam Hemanta father of Nongthon to interact and discussed on improving the academic career of their children. As Kachikhul lies at the border region of the war conflicting children, Johnson reported that it is very challenging to conduct remedial classes. Children are afraid to go out of their houses because of frequent gun firings and some children fled to other regions of Imphal as they are scared to live in their village. As a result of this, Kachikhul Remedial Centre shows decline in overall attendance of children. There is lack of regularization of going to remedial classes and Johnson reported that he finds it very challenging to convince the parents. In addition to this, Kachikhul Village recorded only 15 days working days to conduct coaching classes as compared to other remedial centers that conducted 21 working days. The main reason for this was due to the challenging factors of frequent gun fires and most of the parents of the children that attended remedial classes are village protectors and Meira paibis.

2) Maklang Village: On dated 15th February, 2024 parents meeting with 4 participants (T. Naobi, Kh Ibemma, Kh Shantibala and A Shandhyarani) were made by Remedial teacher Nirmala to discuss about their children's academic. On Dated 24TH February, 2024, Niramla also met with few parents of girl's football players of Maklang Team informing about conducting a Soccer Match on 25th Feb at Salam.

S. Bhiaga Sharma, *ProjectManager* highlighted on the ill-effect of the drug-abuse to the individuals themselves and society and lack of knowledge among the community. He also shared the activities related to reducing harm, stigma & discrimination i.e.organize the activity related for children affected by HIV/AIDS and to provide them space in engagement with the broader society in Manipur and to avail the services which is provided by Wide Angle through MACS. He also shared the harms of drug use and the strategy to control it, about Demand reduction, Supply reduction and harm reduction the effectiveness and importance of harm reduction.

He also shared the OST program taken up Wide Angle and its positive result and motivate their ward to take the up the OST service

The program begins at 12.00 A.M with warm-welcome by Sanayaima, ORW. In the welcome speech, he shared the objectives of the advocacy program and he warmly welcomes all the participants.

In the techinicalsession,S.Bhiaga Sharma, *ProjectManager* shared on the causes of drug abuse among the youth. He shared on the factors like family, environment, social and cultural that lead to drug abuse and it ill-effect to the society . He also shared on the lack of knowledge among the community to deal with the drug abusere,He also highlighted the activities taken up by Wide Angle like neddles and sharing, testing of HIV, Syphillis, Hepatic-B and C, OST, counselling etc. He also shared the harms of drug use and the strategy to control it, about Demand reduction, Supply reduction and harm reduction the effectiveness and importance of harm reduction. He also asked the participants to understand the about need of support to the drug abusers and understand their problems they faced and need to support the programs so that our wards can lead to productive and responsible citizens of the society.

In the end of the session, there is a group discussion with participants and they shared need of preventing the drug abuse in the society and for this we need to take up our own responsible and need to cooperate among each other.

Report of Advocacy report

A One day Advocacy meeting was held on 23rd December 2023 organized by Wide Angle Social Development Organization at Community, Moidangpok,Keithelmenbi The program was attanded by around 25 participants representing club members, women groups, youth leaders.

The program begins at 12.30 P.M with warm-welcome by M. Dhana ORW. In his welcome speech, he shared the objectives of the advocacy program and he warmly welcomes all the participants. After this, S. Bhaiga, Project Manager, Wide Angle facilitates the program by elaborating on the challenges faced by our staff in outreaching to the community, to minimize the level of trauma among women and children cause due to HIV/AIDS and to eliminate stigma and discrimination from the society. Activity related to reducing harm, stigma & discrimination i.e.organize the activity related for children affected by HIV/AIDS and to provide them space in engagement with the broader society in Manipur and to avail the services which is provided by Wide Angle through MACS.

After that Mr. Somokanta, ORW shared that due to lack of information and awareness their localities suffer a lot and it is a privilege to attend this program and hope the entire participant will gain immense knowledge on HIV/AIDS prevention program.

This was followed by some discussion on the topic "The issue of drug user and its impact on the society as well as the rights of drug users ". The participant includes Wide Angle Staffs staff some KPs, spouses and general people of Moidangpok state the harms of drug use and the strategy to control it, about Demand reduction, Supply reduction and harm reduction the effectiveness and importance of harm reduction. Some of our KPs express their woes and lack of knowledge others express their hate and misunderstanding.

As a conclusion remarks, S. Bhaiga shared that it is best to stop drug use but even if they cannot they should follow the safer practice to maintain their health and to avoid the prevention and control of HIV/AIDS and Wide Angle will provide any kind of help which is within their limitation and people's co-operation and help in needed. One should respect and understand the feelings and rights of people whether they are IDU's or not. Because IDU's are also human being and they should be respected and give time as well as encouragement to change their habits by giving proper treatment. The discussion was wind up having a light refreshment altogether.

Around 60 participants male and female were participated in the camp. The participants were Clients, Spouses, Children and community from our project areas and from neighboring villages.

S. Bhaiga, Project Manager, Wide Angle gave a welcome and objectives of organizing the camp. He highlighted the issues of drug dependence problem among the youth in our society. To solve the problem of drug dependence we need a collective effort from all the section of the society. The issues cannot be solved by the government alone. So, we need to support any program taken up by the government as our own responsibility, only then we can save our youth from the drug dependence problem. He also highlighted the responsibility of the community, he said that community participation is one of the key important in preventing the issues of drug in our society, so instead of discriminating the drug dependence persons we need support them and find out the solution of how persons can be treated so that he or she can also lead a productive life. He also shared that Wide Angle organized a health camp in order to know the physical status of the clients as well as their spouses and children and give counseling on the ill effect of drugs and how they can prevent from HIV/AIDS. He further highlighted the services available in the DIC and requested all the participants to take the services and also shared to all those who are known to them. So that we can jointly root out issues of drug and HIH/AIDS.

During the camp the medical team of RIMS and Wide Angle Doctor, conducted general medical examination and health check-up. During the camp, Wide Angle Nurse also screening for HIV for spouses and counseling to all the participants. Moreover, the organization also provided some common medicines like vitamin, calcium dropper for children, appetizer etc.

He highlighted the objectives of the health camp as to check and knows the status of HIV and others co-infection like hepatitis B and C among the HRGs and their spouses and those who are involved in high risk groups. The camp checks other common diseases. So all the persons who are taking part in the camp should take an opportunity of the camp.

He further highlighted the services available in the DIC and requested all the participants to take the services and also shared to all those who are known to them.

During the camp. Dr. Chingkhei, Medical Officer (MO) Wide Angle, conducted general medical examination and health check-up . During the camp, Wide Angle Nurses and Nurses

from MACS also screening for HIV, hepatitis B and C among the HRGs and for spouses and gave counseling to all the participants. Moreover, some common medicines like vitamin, calcium dropper for children, appetizers etc. were also provided during the camp.

During the camp 1 HRG and 1 spouse came out reactive for HIV and for further confirmatory test they sent for another test to CHC, Khumbong

A REPORT ON CRISES RESPONSE AT PATSOI- part-3

On 4th January 2024.

The crises incident took place at Patsoi-3 on 4th January 2024 at 7.00 A.M. one our client is enrolled in the project was caught by neighbors for stealing and selling of hens from the same locality. The incident took place at night and came to know the next morning after investigation of the client. The locality known the client as a hard-core addict and go through many theft cases in the locality. He had severe addiction problem, and he did everything in search of his choice of chemicals. One of our peer educators informed our team members about the incident.

The owner of the family came to know that their hens were missing at the early morning. They suspect our client as the prime accused, and he was seen pass away the house in the last evening. Without wasting time, the family searches in nearby chicken centers. The same numbers and size were found in one of chicken center at Patsoi-part-1. They enquired about the items to the meat seller, but they denied it. At last family members threatened by telling the issue will put up at the police for finding out the truth. Then, the meat seller discloses everything about when and who brought the live meat. They came to know that the client sold all live 5 hens at Rs. 1500. He also mentioned that all the live hens were selling for daughter's school fees.

The owner family came straight to the client's residence, but he was not in his home. At 11.00 AM he came back full high and without asking any question, he was beaten black and blue. He was severely injured, and no one stood in front of him to protect his life.

We reached at 1.00 PM to the client house and found him lying at the bed. The family members also did not give any positive response about the incident. Because of his repeated incidents and hopeless efforts for recovery. We are also totally helpless and did not know what to do. But we talked to family members though they denied listening to what we said. Our nurse also took first aid for the client. We handed over some amounts to the client's mother and suggested that they send him to our DIC for initiating OST treatment as soon as possible. From this crisis we also thought that we need to conduct advocacy programs so that the public can understand drug addicts and how to deal with them.

<u>A REPORT ON CRISES RESPONSE AT Salam Makha Leikai</u>

ON 8th February 2024

The crises incident took place at Salam Makha Leikai on 8th February 2024, Imphal West at 2.00 P.M. one of the clients who is enrolled in the project was caught in relation with the mobile theft in a local shop. He is regular service and came to DIC more often. The incident took happen at around 12.00 noon when the client came to buy pan-masala. He already hasa past theft record in the area.

The owner of the shop kept his mobile charging just near the shelf. The client asked for panmasala. When the owner looks for pan-masala. He quickly took the mobile phone and left the shop very quickly. Just half kilometer distance the owner ran behind and caught the client red-handed. The villagers also rushed to the spot and beat him severely. One of our peer educator eyes witnessed the incident and narrated our team.

When we reached the spot, the scene was almost cool, and our client was severely injured in different parts of the body. We are totally helpless, but we tried our level best to settle the issue. We requested the crowd to forgive him this time and shared about his addiction problem. At last, they accepted our request. Then we called his family members, and we took them to our DIC and gave first aid by our nurse and gave proper counselling to his family members and our client. We also him to avail our service regularly as before. They also agreed and the case was settled.

A REPORT ON CRISES RESPONSE AT Keithelmembi

ON 28th February 2024

A Brief description of the Accident (Not more than 200 words)

The crises incident took place at Keithelmebi on 28th February 2024 at 10.00 A.M our two clients who were enrolled in the project were red handed of money theft by local members. The two clients have already been apprehended by the local members before. A per the

records, both were multiple drugs users. Due to heavy fighting one of our clients was severely injured.

The report came to our team at around 11.00 AM through a mobile call by one of the peer educators. But the sad part was that the news spread so fast that all the villagers rushed to the spot. The victim's family and local club members also attended in the crime. They did not want to finish the incident very quickly. The local youths asked the clients how and when this incident happened. They started beating again by criticizing in relation to the previous incidents.

Our crises team suggested that such incidents must be treated with some professional experts. After all they are our brothers, and we cannot deny this by making many unreasonable demands. It is far better to keep them in rehabilitation center or take the benefit of OST, and we briefly describe the benefit of OST. Let us give them a chance to change their life, so that they can also lead a normal life.

An agreement was reached between the family members and local leaders that they would take the help of professional experts so that the same incidents will repeat again in future. We also made a commitment that our team will also support the clients to lead a normal life. Thus, the crisis was resolved with a positive outcome.

REPORT ON "WORLD AIDS DAY OBSERVATION 2023

World AIDS Day 2023 was observed at Conference Hall ,Wide Angle , Sagolband Moirang Hanuba Leirak on 1st December 2023 under the theme Let Communities Lead. Mr. Surjakumar, President, Wide Angle , Montu Ahanthem, Secretary Wide Angle were the chief guest and president respectively. Around 60 participants representing HRGs, Spouses, PLHIVs, local communities were participats the function. The program started at 10.30 A.M

In the welcome and keynote address, S. Bhaiga Sharma highlighted the theme of the World Day as the world can end AIDS, with communities leading the way.Organisations of communities living with, at risk of or affected by HIV are the fronline of progress in the HIV response. Communities connect people with person-centred public healthservices, build trust, innovate , monitor implementation of policies and services and hold providers accountable. He further shared that communities are being held back in their leadership. Funding shortages, policy and regulatory hurdles, capacity constraints, and crackdown on civil society and on the human rights of marginalised communities are obstructing the progress of HIV prevention and treatment services. If these obstacles are removed, community-led organizatins can add even greater impetus to the global HIV response, advancing progress towards the end of AIDS.

This world AIDS Day is more than a celebration of the achievements of communities, it is a call to action to enable and support communities in their leadership roles. World AIDS Day 2023 will highlight that to unleash the full pontential of community leadeship to enable the end of AIDS.

Communities leadership roles need to be made core in all HIV plans and programmes and in their formulation, budgeting, implementation, monitoring and evaluation. Nothing about us without us. Comminities leadership roles need to be fully and reliably funded to enable the required scale up and be properly supported and remunerated No ending AIDS is more expensive than ending it.

He further shared on the different activities taken up by Wide Angle to achieve target of HIV free by 2030.

Montu Ahanthem, Secretary, Wide Angle shared on theme of World AIDS is observed on 1st December every day to show support for people living with and affected by HIV and to remember those who lost their lives to AIDS. He also shared that the day is an opportunity for public to spread awareness about the status of the pandemic and encourage progress in HIV/AIDS prevention, treatment and care around the world. It has become one of the most widely recognised international health days and a key opportunity to raise awareness, commemorate those who have died and celebrate victories such as increased access to treatment and prevention services.

Mr. Surjakumar, President, Wide Angle shared that communities are the frontline in fight against the HIV/AIDS, so we need to encourage and support them. They are fundamental to combating stigma, discrimination and raising awareness fo hIV and human rights, and for delivering programmes for prevention, treatment, care and support.
